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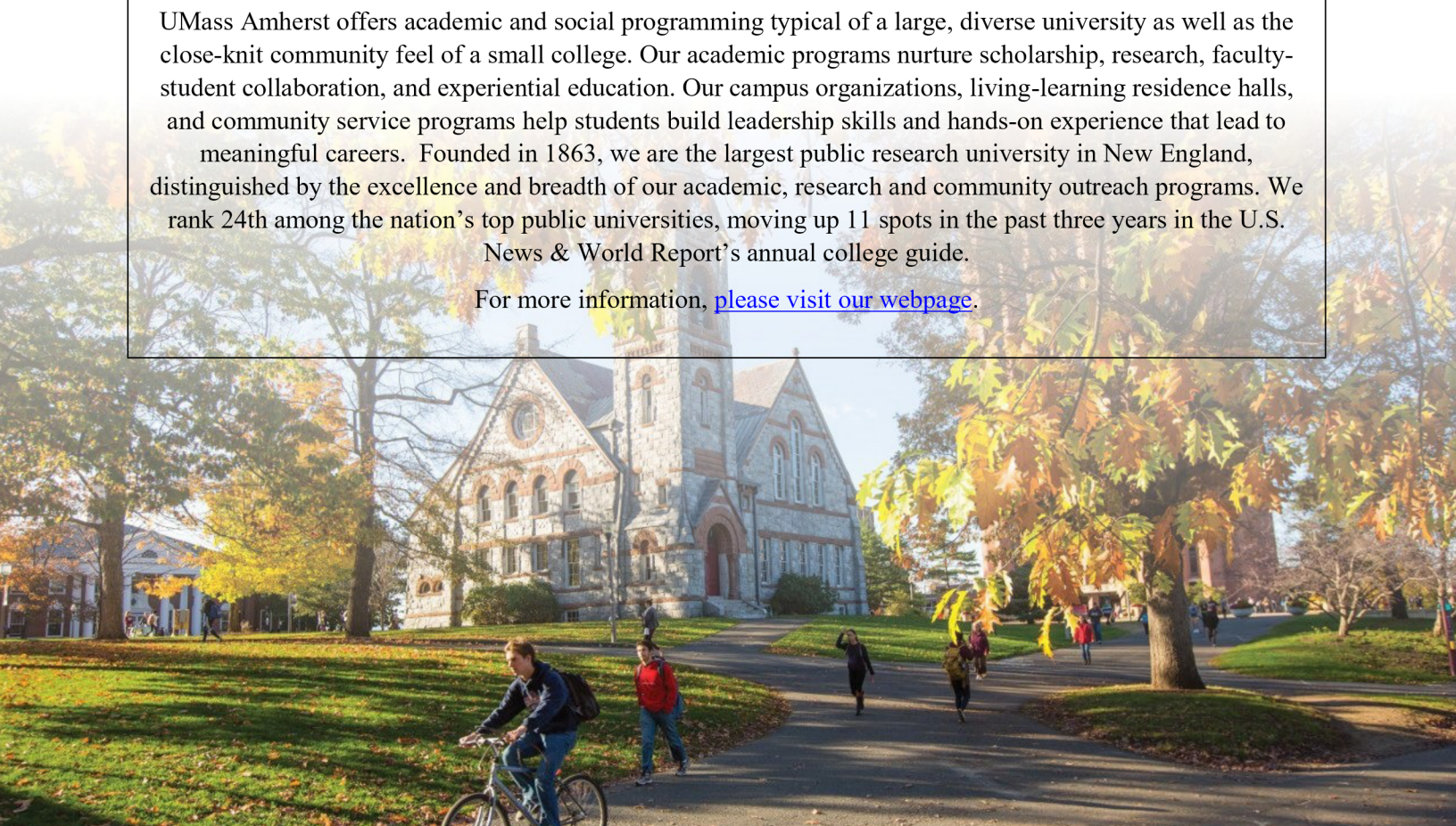

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| Nomination Requirements | <p>Nominations for exchange are made by the home university coordinator. The following is required for each student:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Full name (as written on passport) - Date of Birth (month/day/year format. Example: April 12, 1998 is 4/12/1998) - Personal email address - Duration (Fall Semester, Spring Semester, Academic Year, or Calendar Year) - Academic concentration(s)/major(s) |
| Nomination Deadlines | <p>Fall Semester: February 15 Spring Semester: September 15</p> <p>*Fall semester deadlines are somewhat flexible.</p> |
| Nomination Procedure | <p>To nominate a student, please fill out the Nomination Form found here. Once the student is nominated, they will be given access to the UMass Abroad application by email.</p> |

| Application Procedure | <p>Application materials must be submitted through the online portal. Students who are successfully nominated will be given details on how to apply.</p> |

APPLICATION REQUIREMENTS

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| Transcript(s) | <p>Official transcript(s) of all completed courses as well as a list of current courses.</p> |
| Study Proposal | <p>Writing Your Statement: The study proposal is a way to articulate academic and career goals and explain how a semester/year abroad at UMass Amherst would help the student achieve them. They should mention specific courses that they have taken at their home university, and how they provide an academic foundation for the UMass courses in which they are interested. Things to Avoid: Students should not mention personal matters, travel plans while abroad, or indicate their desire to improve their English in the study proposal.</p> |
| Financial Documentation | <p>Current bank statement(s) are required from either the student, financial sponsor, or both. Bank statements must be dated within the last 6 months.</p> <p>The financial sponsor statement (same as the name on the bank statement) must be signed and submitted online with the application.</p> |
| English Language Proficiency (Required for all students) | <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Test of English as a Foreign Language (TOEFL): minimum score of 80* • International English Language Testing System (IELTS): minimum score of 6.5 • Pearson Test of English (PTE Academic): minimum overall score of 53 • Duolingo English Test: minimum overall score of 105 <p>• Native English Speakers: Note from home institution stating language abilities.</p> <p>*Please note, when reviewing an application we does not superscore language tests (e.g. we do not accept the ETS MyBest Score set).</p> |

ACQUIRING A VISA

Acceptance letters and DS-2019 forms will be mailed to the home university coordinator after acceptance. These will need to be distributed to the student. Students can then apply for their J1 visa. Information on how to apply for a visa will be emailed to the student upon acceptance into the program.

SEMESTER EXPENSE ESTIMATES

All of the following estimated costs are per semester.

All exchange agreements with the University of Massachusetts Amherst cover all costs associated with university tuition and fees. These expenses are paid by the UMass International Programs Office (IPO) and will appear as a payment on the students Bursar bill. The bill must be paid before the start of each semester.

¹ **Room Fees** vary depending on room type. The room fee for a standard shared room without break housing is listed above. For 9 month break housing options, there is an additional fee. [Room fee rates can be found here](#).

² **Dining Services:** Meal plans for students vary in price depending on plan. More information is available on the Meal Plan website. Students are automatically billed for the Unlimited 250 plan but have the [option of changing to another plan](#).

³ **Mandatory Health Insurance:** All full-time students are automatically enrolled in and billed for the **mandatory and non-waivable Student Health Benefit Plan** (SHBP). Fees appear on your Bursar's bill in August for the period of August 1 – January 31 and in January for the period of February 1 – July 31.

⁴ **Miscellaneous** costs include books, supplies, laundry, local travel, entertainment, etc. These costs do not appear on your bill.

COURSE INFORMATION

At UMass Amherst, students register for courses using our Internet-based registration system, known as SPIRE. Course schedule information is **ONLY** available online. Students will need their NetID and password to log in to SPIRE. (The Net ID and password are the same codes used to access their UMass email account.)

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| Course Catalog | Students can browse course offerings by semester without a UMass NetID by visiting www.spire.umass.edu and clicking “Search Classes/Catalog” under the heading <i>Catalogs & Schedules</i> . |
| Course Access | Often, the same classes or similar ones will be offered each year, but sometimes during only one term, e.g., fall or spring. Since the course catalog for future semesters are not online yet, you will need to look at the current as well as previous semesters to see if the course may be offered. |
| Language of Instruction | English (unless a specific language course) |
| Registration Period | <p>Students will receive an email with registration dates and information.</p> <p>Students are encouraged to familiarize themselves with SPIRE and have a variety of courses in mind so they can enroll as soon as their enrollment appointment begins.</p> <p>The first two weeks of each semester is called the “Add/Drop” period where students can freely add classes or drop out of classes without any record.</p> |
| Course Restrictions | <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • No courses are guaranteed • Art, Dance, Music, Nursing and Computer Science courses are closed to exchange students. • Upper level courses in economics, communication, the Isenberg School of Management (ISOM), and Engineering may have limited availability. • Isenberg students are limited to three courses in the department per semester. • English Writing 112, courses that fulfill the “UMass Junior Year Writing Requirement,” and courses that fulfill the “Integrative Experience Requirement” are closed to exchange students. (See the course description.) • Students cannot take UWW/CPE (Continuing & Professional Education/University without Walls) or independent study courses. |
| Course Number System | <p>100-199 – Lower Division Undergraduate – Freshman (first year) level</p> <p>200-299 – Lower Division Undergraduate – Sophomore (second year) level</p> <p>300-399 - Upper Division Undergraduate – Junior (third year) level</p> <p>400-499 - Upper Division Undergraduate – Senior (fourth year) level</p> <p>Instructor Permission may be required:</p> <p>500 - 599 Combined graduate/undergraduate</p> |
| Course Types | Courses will generally be lecture style though some lectures are accompanied with a separate discussion section or lab. Other types of classes are seminars or independent studies with professors (contact professor for information). |
| Course Load | Must be enrolled for a minimum of 12 credits and a maximum of 15 credits each semester. |

GRADING SYSTEM

UMass uses a typical American grade point average (GPA) system. The percentages corresponding to each letter grade vary depending on the professor and the department, but are generally stated in the syllabus.

TRANSCRIPTS

Students must request official transcripts through SPIRE as either an electronic file or a paper copy. At the end of the exchange period, electronic transcripts will be emailed to the home university staff.

SPIRE

SPIRE is the University's secure online student information system. Almost all student functions take place on SPIRE: Students use SPIRE to register for courses, view/pay their Bursar bill, view holds, select/view housing assignments, change meal plans, etc. You will need your Net ID and password to log in to SPIRE (the Net ID and password are the same codes that they use to access their UMass email account).

HEALTH AND SAFETY

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| Student Health Insurance | The U.S. Federal and Massachusetts State governments require that all J-1 visa holders have health coverage. In compliance with Massachusetts insurance requirements, students are automatically enrolled in the UMass health insurance plan, Student Health Benefit Plan (SHBP). All students must be enrolled in health insurance. Coverage by non-U.S. insurance companies will NOT be considered. |
| Immunizations | State law requires that college students have certain immunizations before coming to school. Students are required to submit immunization information through the online system found at www.umass.edu/uhs/immunizations , not to the IPO. Students are not able to submit this information until they have been assigned a UMass email. |
| Health Services | University Health Services (UHS) provides a large range of medical services on -campus for UMass community members including but not limited to: regular appointments, pharmacy, walk-in clinics, and women’s health services. |

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| Academic Support | UMass has multiple libraries, study spaces, tutoring centers, and technology resources available for students to use. Most notably, the Dubois Library stands 28 stories tall as a campus landmark. |
